My Dear Dan,

I suppose you will be wondering why I am not writing, but please forgive me. Since I came here we all have been very unsettled, taking over a new camp. Got no light in the huts yet, and on parade all day & busy as nailers when we come off. I have not heard from you for some time. Your last letter Miss J. forwarded on to me did not yet arrive, owing to the unsettled state of the camp Post office. But I expect I will get it later. Miss J. told me about poor Charlie Baldwin being killed, and I can assure you I am awfully sorry. I was looking forward to seeing him on this side. I heard from one of the 20<sup>th</sup> boys that Harry Goode was wounded. Did you hear anything? If he gets to England he will be sent to this Depot, so I would be able to see him. Excuse this card.
