THE Club, which has received its name by the gracious consent of their Majesties the King and Queen, is intended to provide comfortable sleeping and living accommodation for members of the Dominions and other oversea contingents. It is managed by a Committee containing, amongst others, representatives of the High Commissioners of the Dominions with Mr. A. D. Steel-Maitland, M.P., Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies, as Chairman.

Provision is made for 400 beds, 270 of which are in separate cubicles. There are several bath rooms on each floor and an ample supply of hot water is always available, whether by day or night.

The public rooms consist of a large dining room with small tables, a smaller café with its own kitchen, a large sitting room or lounge, a billiard room with two tables, and a concert room where entertainments are frequently given.

The Club is well furnished throughout, and offers a comfortable home to men on furlough.
