For my assured failures and derelictions, I ask pardon beforehand of my betters and my equals in my Calling here assembled; praying that in the hour of my temptations, weakness and weariness, the memory of this my Obligation and of the company before whom it was entered into, may return to me to aid, comfort and restrain.



INTAKE TO THE CHIPPENA POWER. CANAL.



TRAVELOGUE

A fast travelogue of Europe was presented by Doug McMaster, recently back from a two-and-one-half week stay on the continent.

Doug told the members that he had little trouble with cur-

rency on the continent. "The rency on the continent. The eonly time I got confused was in England," he stated, pointing out that European countries are on the decimal system in currency "I note that England is considering it, too," he added. His tour included Portugal, Italy, Germany, Austria, Holland and England

land and England.

The speaker praised the air travel in Europe stating that the service on short hauls is for better than domestic service in Canada or the United States. He noted that hotel accommodations were superb in all places he stayed.

NO IN-BETWEEN

In Portugal, Mr. McMaster described the people as either very rich or very poor "with no in-between". He said the tourist can live very well on the equivalent of \$4 a day.

In Italy the speaker witnessed an eclipse of the sun and an earth tremor while on his tra-vels. He also visited cathedrals in Milan and attended La Scala (the Opera) where he saw a performance of Madam Butterfly.

He praised Vienna with its wide streets, underground stores restaurants and other facilities, and noted that the night-life began at two o'clock in the morning. "People there go home after work, eat, nap and then go out for night-life," he re-

London was the biggest city the speaker had ever seen. He noted that it took one hour by bus to go from London Airport

to the downtown depot.

One of the most interesting facts and observations of the speaker was the education of the Europeans. "Everybody goes to school. They are made to go by the parents and the young people do not quit to go to work as do many Canadian and American teenagers. Educationally they are far ahead of us," he said.

The speaker was introduced by Connie White and thanked by Manley Strawn.



Description Of Exemplary Citizen Fits The Man

At a retirement dinner held Tuesday evening at Rose Villa Inn Edward William (Bill) Button was described as an exemplary citizen. In this case, we are prepared to say that the description fits the man. Mr. Button was a success in his chosen profession, he gave valued service in public capacities to the community and he won preferment as a member of a service club.

All this was preceded by an honorable record in World War I. A native of England, he came to Canada shortly before the outbreak of hostilities. Enlisting as a private with the Canadian forces, he won promotion to the rank of lieutenant in addition to being awarded the Military Medal.

At the end of the war he entered the University of Toronto and graduated as a mechanical engineer. In 1923, he joined the staff of Electro Metallurgical Co. where his talents found ready recognition. He rose to the position of plant superintendent but was recently relieved of some of these responsibilities on

account of his health.

The Welland Water Commission, of which he was chairman for several years, and the Welland County General Hospital board, on which he served as finance chairman, benefited by his experience and administrative capacity. This efficiency in business did not reduce his enjoyment of social life and he has long been a popular member of the Welland Lions Club. But even here, though modestly displayed, his talents found recognition. He was elected to the position of president and was deputy district governor in 1935-36.

Mr. Button is the type of person who impresses his capabilities on his fellow men in a quiet way. Success never made him arrogant or too demanding. As he climbed the ladder of success he helped others along with him and was ever ready with a word of guidance or advice. Always logical and sometimes plausible, in presenting a case, he has demonstrated the qualities of a firm friend and a good companion. Hundreds will wish for him continued usefulness and contentment in the less strenuous years of his retirement.

Prominent Wellander, E. W. Button Dies At 68

Edward William (Bill) Buton, 156 Edgar St., former plant superintendent of Union Carbide superintendent of Union Carolide Canada Ltd., Metals and Carbon Division, died at the Welland County General Hospital on Sunday, March 5, in his 69th year afer a lengthy illness.

A veteran of the First World War, Mr. Button had been active in civic and community affairs and was a prominent member of the Welland Lions Club.

Born in Sittingbourne, England on April 27, 1892, Button came to Canada in and settled in Welland in Kent, 1913 joining Electromet at that time after graduating from the University of Toronto as a mechanical engineer.

He held the post of works engineer at the plant until 1945, when he was appointed plant superintendent. He retired in May, 1957, after serving with the company for 34 years. He was a member of the Association of professional Engineers of Ontonio and a former section. tario, and a former section, chairman, Industrial Accident Prevention Association.

He enlisted in the Canadian Army in World War 1, serving with the 4th Canadian Infantry Battalion. He rose from the rank of private to lieutenant, ond was decorated with the Military Medal at Passchendaele in 1917. He was a director of the Fourth Canadian Infantry Battalion Veterans Association erans Association.
