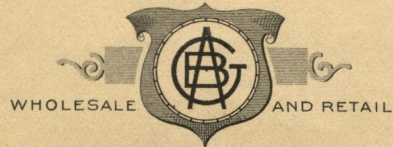

My Dear Letta:

You will no doubt have concluded long before this that we have all forgotten you, but such is not by any means the case. I think it was about a year ago this month that I received your last letter and of course intended answering every day and which has been left until now.

I know I owe you a humble apology, yet I think you will bear with me and overlook my seeming indifference when you hear my explanation of the whole matter. Your letter was written shortly before our Fair and at the time I received it we were preparing to move and Audree was making preparations to get married; this event took place on the 20th day of September last year. We girls were worried to death nearly trying to decide what to do and time wore on; also, during Fair week, our dear boy, Manley paid us his farewell visit shortly before leaving Camp Valcartier for England and from there to France. He has, as you no doubt have heard before this, paid the great price, and since then we have been a very much depressed and heartbroken family. I simply cannot express in words how it has made me feel. I have not been myself since he went away; it has been a constant suspense to us all since the day he joined the colors, and oh, how our hearts ached when he finally departed for overseas. We hoped of
