


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PROGRAMME



- 1. Friday, July 29th, 8 p.m. French Village opened by the Mayor of Bully Grenay and handed over to Mayor Day of Toronto. Mayor Day hands the village over to the troops.
- Friday, 10 p.m. Torchlight Parade to the Maple Leaf Baseball Stadium. Old war-time tunes sing-song in Stadium.
 10.30 p.m. Baseball game between Montreal and Ontario.
- 3. Saturday, 11 a.m. Parade of Colour Party to the Cenotaph and official opening ceremonies by the Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, C.M.G., P.C., M.A., LL.B., LL.D., Prime Minister of Canada.
- 4. Saturday, 2:30 p.m. Canadian Corps March Past. The Hon. Major Ian Mackenzie, P.C., M.A., LL.B., M.P., Minister of National Defense, will take the salute. Parade "falls in" at Fleet Street lighthouse and marches along Fleet Street and up Yonge Street, along Queen to University. Dress—medals, berets and arm bands.
- 5. Saturday, 7 p.m. Unit dinners to be held in Toronto. There will be a remote control radio hook-up from the Canadian Corps dinner in the Royal York Hotel to all dinners. Reading of the resolutions.
- Sunday, 10 a.m. Ceremony at Prospect Cemetery. Service at the Cross of Sacrifice in memory of the twenty-one hundred men who have been buried there since 1918.
 11 a.m. R. C. Military Mass at Varsity Stadium.
 2:30 p.m. Drumhead Service in Riverdale Park against a background replica of Vimy Ridge Memorial.
 8:30 p.m. Canadian Corps Reunion Revue "Twenty Years After" to be held in the Coliseum Building, embracing all the best war-time artistes of the Canadian Corps.
- Monday, 9:30 a.m. Drill competition in front of the Canadian National Exhibition grandstand. Teams of twenty-five men will participate.
 10:15 a.m. Unveiling of unit plaques in Coronation Park.
 Soccer game at Stanley Park. Imperials versus Canadians.
 2:30 p.m. Parade of Canadian Corps by towns.
 8:30 p.m. Boxing in front of Canadian National Exhibition grandstand.
 10:30 p.m. Community Sing Song and Closing Ceremonies at Riverdale Park.
