### Thorold Unit Held Route March Last Evening

THOROLD, June 27.—The Thorold Volunteer Civil Guard held a route march to Thorold South under their commanding officer, Lloyd T. Bradley, last night. ### Monster Parade is Planned

#### Volunteer Guards and Army Units Expected to Join

THOROLD, Oct. 20. — Paul E. Buss, chairman of the War Savings Committee for the nation-wide drive commencing today, stated this morning that the committee is working on plans to hold a monster parade on Friday night in connection with the drive for more subscribers to war savings certificates and the country's war effort.

It is expected to have army units from the district in the parade along with the Civil Volunteer Guard, the Thorold Reed Band, Canadian Corps Trumpet Band, Protection Hose Company and the Auxiliary A.R.P. firemen and the fire-fighting trucks and equipment. The question of lighting the route of the parade with flares is also being discussed. The parade will proceed to Soldier's Field according to present plans, where a monster bonfire will be kindled. Further details of the event will be published later by the committee.

## Home Guard at Thorold

### Canadian Corps Held Route March Last Night

THOROLD, June 12.—The Canadian Corps platoon of the Thorold Home Defense Force went on its first route march last night through the streets of the town. Headed by the Thorold Canadian Corps Bugle Band, over forty strong, some 24 men paraded from the Corps hall on Chappel Street through the business section. Large numbers of people silently watched the parade of stern-faced veterans.

Lloyd T. Bradley, flight-lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps during the last Great War and president of the Thorold Branch Red Cross Society, has been chosen commander of the Corps platoon and led his men last night in the route march. The men put in some time at drill on the Corps hall grounds prior to the march. Mayor W. A. Hutt spoke to the assembled veterans and gave them a brief outline of the duties of the defence force.

A mass meeting of the Corps, Legion and Imperial platoons and veterans and private citizens interested in the work of the Home Defense Force had been called for Friday night of this week. The meeting will be held on the Corps grounds on Chappel Street, when further applications for service will be received. Mayor Hutt stated this morning that there are still plenty of application forms available for private citizens at the municipal building and urged all who could possibly do so, to fill them out.

# SERVICE RIBBON QUALIFICATIONS

**THE 1939-1945 STAR.** The 1939-1943 Star is re-designated the "1939-45 Star." The time qualification is six months' operational service for the Army, Navy and Merchant Navy (two months for Air Crew), as defined, or less for service in specified operational commands.

A Gilt Rose Emblem is worn by air crew of fighter aircraft engaged in the Battle of Britain between 10th July and 31st October, 1940.

**THE ATLANTIC STAR** commemorates the Battle of the Atlantic. It is primarily for convoys and their escorts, anti-submarine forces, etc., but includes also certain Army and Air Force personnel. The time qualification is six months' service afloat in Home Waters, the North Atlantic, the South Atlantic in part, or with convoys to North Russia, or anywhere at sea for the Merchant Navy if one voyage has been made in a defined area, (two months for air crew of R.C.A.F.), from 3rd September, 1939 to 8th May, 1945).

By those who qualify for MORE THAN ONE of the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, and the France and Germany Star, a Silver Rose Emblem is worn on the Ribbon of the Star awarded.

**THE AIR CREW EUROPE STAR** is for operational flying over Europe including the United Kingdom. The time qualification is two months in air crew between 3rd September, 1939 and 5th June, 1944.

For regulations governing Silver Rose Emblem, see "Atlantic Star."

**THE AFRICA STAR** commemorates the expulsion of the enemy from North Africa. It is granted for services by the Army and Air Force in North Africa and adjacent areas including Malta, and by the Navy and Merchant Navy anywhere in the Mediterranean between 10th June, 1940 and 12th May, 1943.

One of the following Emblems may be awarded:—An "8" for the Eighth Army, a "1" for the First Army, or a Silver Rose Emblem for the Navy, Air Force, Merchant Navy, and 18th Army Group Headquarters.

**THE PACIFIC STAR** is for operational service in the Pacific War Theatre, excluding the Burma Campaign, etc. It is granted to the Army, Navy, Merchant Navy and Air Crew.

A Silver Rose Emblem denotes qualification for the Burma Star AS WELL AS the Pacific Star.

**THE BURMA STAR** is for operational service in the Burma Campaign, including Assam, Bengal, the East Indies, etc. It is granted to the Army, Navy, Merchant Navy and Air Crew.

For regulations governing Silver Rose Emblem, see "Pacific Star".

**THE ITALY STAR** is for operational service on land in Italy or Sicily, and in certain areas of the Mediterranean, between 11th June, 1943 and 8th May, 1945. It is granted to the Army, Navy, Merchant Navy and R.A.F. Air Crew.

**THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR** is for operational service in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany between 6th June, 1944 and 8th May, 1945. It is granted to the Army, Navy, Merchant Navy and Air Force.

For regulations governing Silver Rose Emblem, see "Atlantic Star."

**THE DEFENCE MEDAL** commemorates certain non-operational and civil defence services between 3rd September, 1939 and 8th May, 1945, in the United Kingdom, Mediterranean, Indian Ocean, etc., and to the end of active hostilities in the Pacific to areas in the Pacific and for specified non-operational service overseas. The time qualification is three months for Mine and Bomb Disposal Units, one year for non-operational service with the Forces overseas from or outside the country of residence, with certain exceptions; or three years with the Forces in non-operational areas in the country of residence, if subject to air attack or closely threatened, or with approved Civil Defence Service in military operational areas, or non-operational areas subject to air attack or closely threatened.

**THE CANADIAN VOLUNTEER SERVICE MEDAL** is for 18 months' volunteer service in the Canadian Armed Forces.

The Maple Leaf Emblem denotes 60 days' service beyond the territorial boundaries of Canada.

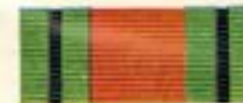

Dear Mr. Bradley,

I am writing you as a member of the Special Names Group of the Seventh Victory Loan to ask for your renewed and, if possible, increased participation. The books will open on the 23rd of October.

The successful invasion of Europe is putting upon Canada, as well as all the other Allied Nations, the responsibility of furnishing every kind of war supplies on an unprecedented scale, so that our cash requirements are at the highest point in our history. The objective in the Seventh Loan is \$1,300,000,000, which is an increase of \$100,000,000 over the last Loan, and we are confidently hoping that we will get a much larger amount.

There are always some investors whose circumstances are not as favourable as in former Loans, which places a greater responsibility on those who have cash and are able to increase their purchases.



## Fast Hospital Planes Land Canuck Casualties

A Forward British Airfield, June 13 (CP).—Six Canadian soldiers were among the first battle casualties evacuated by air today from the front line in Normandy to emergency hospitals in England by the R.A.F. Transport Command.

Less than two hours after a big transport plane lifted them from a casualty clearing station on an airfield within range of snipers' guns, the men were in bed in a tented air evacuation centre nestled in the English countryside.

Three planes were the pathfinders for the flying service which will bring Allied wounded quickly to the most expert medical care. As a pioneer effort it put the spotlight on obstacles of the expedition. The first plane was grounded in Normandy, where a gale whipped sand over the plane and patients for more than six hours.

Pte. Philip Edgar Kern of Kitchener, Ont., was still in bed when the first plane brought him to England. His leg was torn by a shell burst and he was rushed to an ambulance.

A couple more Canadians aboard the transport were P.O. Len Kearney, Toronto, a Mosquito pilot, and Navigator P.O. Norman Bradford, Belleville, Ont., who had to crash-land on the beachhead when flak damaged their plane.

"Before the beachhead opened the boys who crashed sure didn't get out this easy," Kearney added. "If that story is going to Canada, tell my mom not to worry. I'm all right."

There were Canadian, British, American and French soldiers aboard the second and third planes to return.

Pte. James Curran of Fitch, Ont., whose foot was injured, could hardly realize that a few hours before

he had been in the front line with his unit.

"We'd done three solid days and nights and I guess we used every type of warfare there is in that front line," he said. "I won't say the going wasn't tough, but the Jerries are still going in the right direction."

Sgt. Bert McDermotte of Toronto was brought back with wounds in the arms and legs. He had been wounded by mortar fire. Pte. Georges Derie of a French-Canadian regiment, who spoke no English, also was brought by air to Britain.

Sitting around the station in dispersal huts and in the mess listening to reports of the trip were men who will fly the England-France route when it becomes the milk run for carrying supplies across the Channel and bringing back the wounded.

P.O. Frank Vines, Goderich, Ont., is one of these men. He had taken a plane-load of paratroopers across on D-Day.

About 60 Canadians at this station will fly the merry trips. They include P.O.'s Ken Fitzpatrick, Montreal; Russel Down, St. Thomas; Floyd Henry, Gray, Sask.; George Cappel, Galt; John Stewart, Alisa Craig, Ont.; Bill Bradley, Thorold; and Keith Eadie, Vancouver, and P.O. Claude Roy, Regina. Most of these pilots are veterans of transport flying.

## Ready for Blackout

### St. Catharines Awaits Authorization Before Action

St. Catharines has received no directions to hold a blackout, Mayor Charles Daley stated today. This city has been awaiting definite word for 10 days authorizing a blackout, but no instructions had been received at noon today.

Hon. Mr. Conant listed vulnerable areas and municipalities, showing that this district is pretty well organized. Niagara-on-the-Lake is shown as not being organized, but a civil guard has been considered there and felt to be unnecessary due to the proximity of the military camp.

Shown as organized in Area 7, Group "A," are St. Catharines, Grimsby town, Merriton, Beamsville, Port Dalhousie, Louth Township, and Grantham Township. In Group "B" Welland, Crowland Township and Humberstone Township are not organized. Organized are Thorold Town and Township, Port Colborne, Humberstone Village.

Mr. Conant hoped that areas not organized will take immediate action to organize so that no compulsory measures will be necessitated.

## Defence Activity

### Test Blackouts to be Held in 52 Centres at Early Date

Test blackouts will be required "at the earliest possible date," of the fifty-two Ontario vulnerable area municipalities which have organized Civilian Defense (A.R.P.) committees, Attorney-General Conant, chairman of the provincial Civilian Defense Committee, has warned in a statement.

At the same time, he advised nineteen other municipalities in areas designated as vulnerable by the department of national defense, and which have not organized defense committees, that it was necessary to organize without delay.

Broad hint that delay in organization would not be brooked under broad powers vested in federal defense legislation, was given in the declaration. "It is hoped that it may not be necessary to enforce provisions making this compulsory."

The directions, issued in official memorandum to the seventy-one municipalities involved, came within a week of the attorney-general's general statement that organization work is to be intensified.

Mr. Conant, in explanation of the latest move, said: "In view of the war situation civilian defense increases in importance and becomes more necessary every day."

"The fact that they are organizing civilian defense on a large scale in the United States makes it more apparent that no time should be lost and no effort should be spared in this province."

"Civilian defense organizations must be brought to the highest possible state of effectiveness without delay. Their activities and the training of their personnel must be intensified to the utmost."

The next blackout in the Toronto districts' fourteen municipalities, acting as a unit under a joint committee, has already been set for Sept. 19. The other thirty-eight organized municipalities are asked to propose dates and advise the Ontario committee. The local situation will then be studied by officials from headquarters and a date settled and a blackout ordered.

Mr. Conant at the same time revealed that the A.R.P. equipment at hand will be distributed equitably among the municipalities. He announced also that a staff of Ontario Civilian Defense (A.R.P.) inspectors will be established. These will visit all municipalities in the areas designated as vulnerable by Ottawa to consult with municipal authorities and officials of the defense committees.

"They will render every possible assistance in organizing Civilian Defense Committees where they have not been organized already and in completing and increasing the effectiveness of the organizations where such committees have been organized," said the provincial chairman.

Vulnerable area municipalities which have not organized are asked to advise the provincial committee secretary, H. D. McNairn, K.C., at Queen's Park, as to what action is contemplated by them.

## Highlanders to Take Part in Remembrance Day Program

THOROLD, Nov. 8.—Plans have been completed for the Remembrance Day parade to be held in Thorold on Monday morning, Nov. 11th, and it promises to be one of the largest and most colorful ever witnessed by citizens in town. Lt. Lloyd T. Bradley, commanding officer of the Thorold Volunteer Civil Guard, will be parade marshal for the event.

The parade is to be divided into three sections. Lt. Bradley informed The Standard this morning that Lt. Col. 
