



# SPORTS

## Hints on Court Deportment

In this case Court Deportment refers to Tennis Courts, therefore lounge wolves are not interested in these hints which are as follows:

1. Tennis has always been a game which demands the highest sense of sportsmanship. Even in tournament matches very few games are umpired and you are on your honour to call the shots on your side of the net. If in doubt give the benefit to your opponent or suggest that the point be played over. Never interfere with your opponent's decisions as he is in a much better position than you to determine whether the ball is in or out. If he asks your opinion, give it honestly whether for or against you. Any ball hitting even any part of the chalf line is good. Don't give any indication in your manner that you feel you have been robbed, usually you are wrong.

In receiving a service which is a "Fault" don't return it but call quickly "Fault" as you let the ball go by. Nothing is more upsetting to your opponent than to have his first service, which is a fault, returned to him.

3. In retreiving a ball which you are giving to your opponent for serving, don't hit it across the net unless he is in a position to take the ball: nothing is a more aggrevating than to be continually walking back to the fence to get balls which should have been returned when you were in a position to handle same. You can speed up the game by the above method.

4. In playing doubles don't poach on shots on your partner's side of the court, otherwise, you may find that one day your partner will get fed up and after serving will retire to the fence, sit down in a chair and not move again until her time to serve comes around again. (i.e. it has happened)

5. Accept tough breaks gracefully and when your opponent has caught you on a particularly good shot at least grin not frown.

6. Don't throw your racquet in exasperation, accept the tough breaks as you do the good breaks with no outward display of emotion.

7. Don't forget that if in returning a shot, any part of you, your clothing or racquet touches the net you lose the point. Advise your opponent regarding this as normally he wouldn't call it.

8. At the end of a match which you have lost be the first to shake hands with your opponent. Do it gracefully and show that you are a good loser. Accept congratulations on winning with some remark to the loser about the good sporting game you had and if the loser was obviously not playing his usual game tell him so. This helps to lessen the sting of the defeat.
